

## The Cospatrick Tragedy

## INTRODUCTION

A modest drinking fountain in the form of a stone obelisk stands on Shipton-under-Wychwood Green, in the centre of the village. We might pass it every day with barely a thought for its significance. It commemorates the seventeen Shipton parishioners who lost their lives when the ship on which they were travelling caught fire and sank in November 1874. They were 7,000 miles from their home en route to New Zealand.

Who were these seventeen people?

Why were they on a sailing boat travelling to New Zealand?

What were they leaving behind?

What were they expecting to find on their arrival in New Zealand?

This small book is an attempt to answer these questions on the 150th Anniversary of this tragic event.
